

Big Stone Lodge

PWWS meetings are held at the Big Stone Lodge at the new Dennis Johnston County Park at 709 Riley Fuzzel Road.

The directions to get there are much the same as to the Nature Center. Aldine-Westfield turns into Riley Fuzzel Road just northeast of Spring so there are several ways to get there.

1. Take the Rayford/Sawdust exit and go East (right) on Rayford Rd. It dead ends at Riley Fuzzel, then turn South (right) and drive to the Dennis Johnston Park past Spring Creek and on the right. or, 2. take Spring-Cypress east to Aldine Westfield through Olde Town Spring, turn left and then on to Riley Fuzzel for a short distance and turn left; or, 3. Take Aldine Westfield north from Mercer Arboretum until it turns into Riley Fuzzel. Turn right and watch for the Dennis Johnston Park on the left.

Pay your taxes by April 15; then come to the PWWS program that evening!



The Galveston Pleasure Pier is now home to a sea turtle conservation sign which represents hundreds of hours of work and the total dedication of a young lady named Savannah Rose Lohec of Pearland. Savannah Rose has earned the Gold Award which represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. The award recognizes girls who demonstrate extraordinary leadership through projects that have sustainable impact in their communities-and beyond. Savannah Rose has done just that.



Working with Joanie Steinhaus of the Sea Turtle Restoration Project's Galveston office, Savannah Rose has conducted classes about sea turtles at the Galveston Island State Park, given presentations to area schools, made receptacles for discarded fishing line and also focused attention on the importance of sea grass to Gulf beaches for nesting sea turtles by making a video. The funding Savannah Rose needed to purchase the sign came when she submitted her project to the ABC Summer of Service Awards and it was chosen among thousands of entries in a conservation competition. I remember reading this delightful poem by Joyce Kilmer in school and thinking to myself how glorious he made trees sound in my young mind. This is one of many favorable incidents that occurred in my life that drew me from being a bookworm to actively participating in the wonders of Nature.

I did not have anyone who taught me about the grandeur of trees. As I got into volunteerism as an adult I discovered the joys of plants.

Nowadays there is a lot of competition for a child's attention. What better way to entice your grandchildren or children away from their computer games than to head out of doors. Winter and spring are a great time to plant trees as well as perennials. Here are few reminders on how to plant a tree by the Dirt Doctor, Howard Garrett:

1. Dig an ugly hole—The hole should be dug exactly the same depth as the height of the ball.
2. Run a perk test—Fill the hole with water and wait until the next day. If the water level does not drain away overnight, a drainage problem is indicated.
3. Plant high—The root flare is part of the trunk and should be placed above ground. The top of the root ball should be slightly
